Our prime learning challenge this term is: What impact did WWII have on Britain? As Histori-

ans, the children will be exploring the events that led up to the war, looking at the significance of the Blitz, and immersing themselves in the life of an evacuee—and even calculating their own

rations! As Artists, the children will continue to develop their skills in applying line, tone and

pattern to create realistic drawings. At the end of the topic, we will be using these skills to pro-

duce some gargoyle artwork. **As Writers**, the children will step into the shoes of a person who lived through WW2. They will use historically accurate information gained in their history les-

sons and use their own creativity to create emotional first person accounts. As Readers, the

children will be looking at a variety of WWII texts—both fiction and non-fiction. They will develop

fluency of more complex texts alongside improving their comprehension skills.

In other areas of the curriculum, **as Scientists**, the children will be looking at the circulatory system and healthy life styles. The children will learn about the work of William Harvey and even make their own blood! To the end the unit, the children will be examining a real lamb's heart, dissecting it to identify its anatomy. **As Mathematicians**, the children will deepen their knowledge of place value and begin their unit of addition and subtraction—building their fluency and applying their skills to reasoning problems.

In other subjects, **in RE**, we are looking at what it means for a Muslim to follow God. **In Music,** the children will be concentrating on rhythm and composing, linked to Morse Code and war-time composers, such as Grazyna Bacewicz. **In French,** the children will be completing the unit: C'est Moi. **In PSHE**, the children will be completing the puzzle: Being Me in My World. They will consider the year ahead, consider the rights of a child and compare their lives with the life of other children around the world. **In Computing,** the children will develop their knowledge and understanding of using a computer to produce 3D models.
