Headlands Primary School - Termly curriculum newsletter

Year 5, Term 1– The Industrial Revolution



Our prime learning challenge this term is: What was the impact of the Industrial Revolution on Britain? The children will experience what life was like as they step into the shoes of a Victorian child, exploring the hardship they faced by going to work in factories and up chimney sweeps. As Historians, the children will develop their understanding and knowledge of the impact of the Industrial Revolution, how people's lives have been shaped by this period of history and how Britain has influenced and been influenced by the wider world. They will gain an understanding of the significant turning points in British history, for example, the rise of the Steam Age and the first railways. As Artists, we will be learn the technical skill of drawing from 1- and 2-point perspective. We will have an opportunity to learn the technique and then apply to two pen and ink pieces: a road, bridge or path scene and a finished street scene inspired by the work of Lowry and our work about the Industrial Revolution. In Computing, the children will create Vector images of warning signs to support the health and safety of factory workers during the Industrial Revolution. As Musicians, inspired by the industrial revolution and the song 'Jerusalem' the children will compose and perform music. As Writers, we will be developing our skills by writing to entertain and writing to inform. Children will endeavour to write a setting description, character description and a diary entry based on Charles Dickens' classic Oliver Twist. As Readers, children will be exploring both fiction and non-fiction texts each week, including Oliver Twist.

In other areas of the curriculum, **as Mathematicians**, children will be developing their understanding of numbers up to 1,000,000 and place value. We will carry out lots of investigations and explore different ways of representing our findings, while continuing to enhance basic skills and the learning of times tables. **As Scientists**, the children will learn that the Earth, Sun and Moon are spherical bodies and will consider evidence to support this. They will be able to explain about day length and why we get daytime and night-time through an understanding of the rotation of the Earth and its position relative to the Sun. They will understand what constitutes a year by exploring the orbit of the Earth around the Sun. In **French**, the children will continue to enhance their communication skills. They will also explore Christianity in **RE**, enhancing their understanding of what matters most to Humanists and Christians, investigating the different types of beliefs humans hold. Our topic in **PHSE** is 'being me in my world'. In **PE**, we will be enhancing our social skills through games and movement. On PE days, the children must come to school in their PE kit. This will be taking place outside so the children will need appropriate kit to be able to take part.

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
